BS3473	<p>TAUNTON, DEVON, BISHOP FOX'S GIRLS SCHOOL, athletics prize medal, in silver (not hallmarked), circular, 32mm, obverse engraved with the school bdge, a pelican plucking her breast to feed her young, ribbon around engraved "BISHOP FOX'S GIRLS SCHOOL", the plain field engraved beneath "TAUNTON". Reverse, a laurel wreath, engraved within "DORA MATHISON". Integral ring suspension, with its original ribbon and silver top suspender brooch, this engraved "GAMES CHAMPION" and reverse with maker's mark "F&S" (for Fattorini & Sons) and additionally stamped "Sterling", probably circa 1890-1900 vintage.</p>	£30.00	€36
BS3522	<p>THE GOLD GLASGOW ULSTER ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT'S BREAST BADGE, awarded to Andrew L. Horner, K.C., M.P., comprising an ornate openwork engraved and enamelled shield shaped breast badge in 9 carat gold (hallmarked Birmingham 1909), the centre of the badge enamelled with the arms of Glasgow in pink, grey, black, green, brown, yellow and red, title "Glasgow Ulster Association" engraved above, reverse engraved "Presented to A.L. Horner Esq K.C., M.P. (South Tyrone) as a memento as having presided at the annual re-union of the natives of Ulster in the City Hall, Glasgow, 6.10.10.". With its original 9 carat gold "Union" brooch suspender, engraved with thistles, roses and shamrocks. Virtually as struck, attractive and very rare, in its original David Dow & Son, Glasgow, silk and velvet lined case of issue. Weight 20 grams, 2.4 inches (6cm) high approx including suspender.</p> <p>Andrew L. Horner, born Limavady, 1863, was educated at Foyle College, Londonderry and Queen's University, Belfast. A member of the north-west Irish circuit, he was a Bencher at the King's Inns, Dublin and was appointed K.C. 1904 and was M.P., Unionist, for South Tyrone, Ireland, from January 1910. Horner first contested the South Tyrone seat in 1906, and was successfully elected in 1910. He married Annie, the younger daughter of the late John Robb, J.P., Belfast. Horner resided during his latter years at 34 Fitzwilliam Place, Dublin, and was a member of the Constitutional and Carlton clubs.
